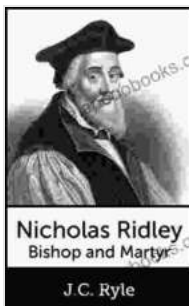


Nicholas Ridley: Bishop and Martyr

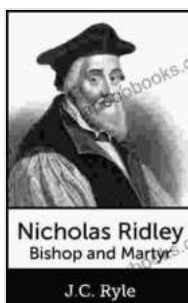
